

ANNUAL ELECTIONS

The annual elections will be held at our January meeting. We will be voting on a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Trustee. Any member in good standing is eligible to fill any one of these offices. To help you decide who you think would best fill these offices, the following is a brief guide to their duties:


PRESIDENT: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Club, see that the bylaws are enforced, call such meetings as are needed, and be responsible for the execution of all motions passed by the members. The President shall also be public relations administrator and liaison between the Club and all other groups.

VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice President shall assume the President's responsibilities in the absence or disability of the President, keep constantly informed of Club activities, and shall be responsible for special programs and social events.

SECRETARY: The Secretary is responsible for minutes at all general membership and board meetings, reads minutes of previous meetings when requested, keeps a file of all minutes, shall provide copies of minutes for each board member upon request, is responsible for all member notices, and is responsible for all correspondence, both incoming and outgoing.

TREASURER: The Treasurer collects all dues and records all moneys belonging to the Club, disburses same under the direction of the President, deposits the funds of the Club in the name of the Club in such bank or banks as may be designated by the Executive Committee, and submits a statement of accounts at each meeting. The books and accounts shall at all reasonable times be open to inspection by any member. The Treasurer shall be responsible for disbursement of moneys for bird bands.

TRUSTEE: One Trustee is elected each year to serve a three year term. A person serving as Trustee is ineligible for other elected office. Duties shall be to serve as coordinators of the Club, assuring a meeting place, acting as assistants to the President, and serve as a grievance committee. They shall conduct an annual audit of all Club records, Treasurer's and Secretary's books, etc. The Trustees whose terms of office have not expired shall serve as the election committee and shall conduct the annual elections. The Trustees shall review all absences of officers and shall fill any vacant office by either appointment or special election with the membership.

Our dues are due in January. Checks should be made out to **RAINBOW FEATHERS BIRD CLUB**. Please pay them at the January meeting or by mail to Tammy Carol at Rainbow Feathers Bird Club, PO Box 1587, Garden City MI 48135.

Please note any of our new members that have joined the club between July and December 2018 do not have to pay dues in January. Your membership is valid until January 2020!

BUT IT'S ORGANIC!

Just before Christmas I received a phone call from a woman, but it was a warning call. It was

warning against things that are organic. It seems this woman wanted her house to smell like Christmas so she got a diffuser and sought out only organic natural oils to use in it for the safety of her birds. She set it up and left to do some shopping, but when she got back is when things turned tragic. As she walked in the door, she noticed the house was way to quiet and when she got to the back room, she found out why. Her four birds were dead. Lost was a Greenwing Macaw, a Double Yellow headed Amazon, an African Gray and a Blue Crowned Conure. To say she was devastated would be an understatement and the culprit was the diffuser.

You need to really do your homework as to what is safe around birds and what is not even if it says it is organic it may not be bird safe and that was the case here. She never told me exactly what she used but it

was all too clear that this is what killed her birds. That brings me to products that are labeled pet safe. Pet safe does not mean that it is bird safe many pet safe products are tested on cats and dogs and they can tolerate high parts per million than a bird or any other type of exotic can't. So, what is safe for a cat or dog could still kill a bird. The moral of this is do your homework, ask questions and truly research how safe a product is before you use it around birds. This will save you a whole lot of heartache and keep your birds clean, healthy and happy.

BIRD SHOWS

As a bird club, we do several types of shows during the year. We do Outdoor Events, Educational Shows, and Senior Shows. These events are just as important as the outdoor events we do. The Senior and Educational shows are just one-day events and will take around 3 hours. Senior Shows are conducted at assorted assisted living and nursing homes in the area. We will bring in 20-30 or more birds in from parakeets all the way up to the macaws. The seniors absolutely love it. They light up when we bring out these birds. Many of them have never held a bird before, so it's amazing when you hear a 102 year old woman tell you that it's the first time in her whole life she's ever held a bird in her hands.

Educational shows run along the same vein, except they're usually done in schools or other kids groups.

Lastly, our big events like the Pet Expo and the Ypsilanti Heritage Festival are three day events that can run up to 10 hours a day. They're a lot of work, but SO much fun.

We would like to invite all members old and new to stop in on these fundraising opportunities and see what they're all about!
